Questions to Ask to Find Your Dream Horse



Before Going to Look at a Horse

- What's the horse's age and has it been verified by a vet or equine dentist?
- What's the horse's history and does it have any health concerns?
- · Does the horse have any vices and why are you selling the horse?
- · How does the horse behave with other horses?
- Is the horse suitable for a beginner, advanced beginner, or advanced rider?
- Does the horse ever leave the farm? What is it primarily used for?
- Is the horse barn or buddy sour? Will it ride off by itself?
- · Does the horse load and trailer well?
- Can I have access to the vet records and do you welcome a pre-purchase exam?



When You Meet the Horse

- How does it respond to being groomed, fly sprayed, bathed, and blanketed?
- Does it have good posture? Is the horse parking in or out or shifting weight on its front feet?
- How does it respond to being saddled? Is it extremely girthy?
- Does it stand to be mounted?
- How does it hold its head in the walk, trot, and canter?
- Is the horse sound in all its gaits?
- Does it know its leads?
- How does it respond to riding off alone?



Red Flags

- If the owner asks for a deposit to come look at the horse, dig deeper. Oftentimes, these
 are scams.
- If the owner won't let you get a vet check or pre-purchase exam, this is a red flag that something is wrong with the horse.
- If the horse has unusual posture, or has a limp or a gait that isn't quite right, discuss
 this with your veterinarian at the PPE.
- If the horse has extreme girthiness when saddling, it could have an ulcer or back pain.





Always let the owner lead the horse around and ride the horse first so you can see if it's safe and can evaluate it from the ground.
